

Mothers' Program were 2 months classes held at NJV School for the mothers of our students. English, Hygiene and General Knowledge was taught in it.


Better Primaries, More Secondaries

The data on Sindh education speaks for itself: 51% of children in Sindh are out of school.¹ For the roughly 4 million children enrolled, attendance averages 67%.² Sindh literacy rates hover at 58%, down by 4% from 2015 and egregiously missing the Millenium Development Goal of 88%.³ Even those considered literate consistently lag behind: 58% of class 5 students cannot read a simple Urdu story meant for class 2.4 A worrisome list of other disastrous

statistics on infrastructure, education levels, attendance, teacher quality, corruption, and more has been omitted for the purposes of minimizing reader hopelessness.

Problems abound; however, a cursory analysis reveals potential for simple solutions. The data below originates from the Sindh Education Department and has been graphed with pretty colors.




Sindh Education Department

The graph above show enrollment by class. In the first block of red are primary schools. High student enrollment in Class I suggests a desire to seek education. However, primary schools fail to inspire and retain students; over half drop out before reaching secondary schools. Enrollment from class VI to X, while low, is fairly stable, indicating that primary schools are the front line in keeping students in school.

The graph below represents the distribution of government schools by type, perhaps the most oft-quoted statistic in Sindh government education, again taken from the Sindh Education Department. Primary schools utterly dominate, representing 91% of all government schools.5 Keeping in mind the data above, the problem with primary schools is lack of quality, not

access or size. The average primary school is tiny, with 69.1 students and 2.25 teachers.6 This highly distributed system makes improving primary through centralized training nearly impossible. However, if empowered, such a system could rapidly evolve into a hotbed for divergent experimentation.

In stark contrast, only 4% of government schools are secondary and higher secondary schools.⁷ These schools, despite low overall enrollment, tend to retain students. While quality issues undoubtedly exist, the core problem with secondary and higher secondary schools is access.

Thus, through conducting a simple analysis of the most commonly available data, we can make some basic conclusions about steps the government can take:

- Primary schools are where the student loss occurs. We need to increase quality and retention.
- Centralized training initiatives for such a distributed system will be basically impossible. Decentralized models must be considered.
- Secondary and higher secondary schools are retaining students through matriculation and inter (whatever the means), but access is low. We need to increase quantity (and, to be frank, also increase quality, a topic outside the scope of this article).
