


Moon sighting on NJV rooftop

Cedar College regularly sends a passionate team to NJV School to help sort our antique literature for the NJV library.




KGS Peer Tutor Society

Too Many Languages



How many languages are too many to teach a primary or secondary student? Two? Three? Four? Five? In Sindh government schools, we currently attempt to teach four: Urdu, Sindhi, English, and Arabic. Each language has its proponents. Urdu is the national language.1 Sindhi, endemic to this ancient land.2 English remains the international language for the foreseeable future3, and Arabic the language of our nation's dominant religion.4 Looking forward, a fifth - Mandarin - is slowly entering the dialogue, whose advocates stress the language's necessity in tapping China's economic spring.5

Many readers will undoubtedly be wary of looking for guidance to the West, to whom we can credit an irreversible erosion and devastation to our native tongues. Yet, in answering this question of second languages, Europe can provide a wonderful example, grappling for centuries with many of the questions faced by our education system today. The European Union has 24 official languages

and 28 countries.6 Thanks to the Schengen Agreement of 1985, European residents enjoy free travel within the EU, enabling unprecedented mobility within a diverse array of linguistic and cultural environments.7 European parents must choose among globally spoken languages such as English, Spanish, French, German, Russian, Italian, and Dutch (not to mention their native language, if none of the previous), collectively whose speakers are in the billions in every populated time zone on Earth.8


Second Languages Studied by EU Primary Students



So, how many languages do European children, beset on all sides by world languages, learn in school? Two? Three? Five? Six? The data is startling. Based on figures published by Eurostat, a research and publishing body of the European Union, only 4.6% of EU primary children study 2+ second languages.9 This is in stark contrast to Sindh, in which all government school children are learning three second languages.

Looking beyond primary, the data doesn't get much better. The graph below is a startling indictment of our government language education system. Our ambitions in primary are off the charts, utterly out of sync with the policies of major European countries, some of whom themselves, like Finland and Denmark, lack globally-spoken native tongues. In secondary, the gap narrows, but remains, with all listed countries save Finland and Netherlands still below the 2 mark. Only Finland, in the highest levels of education, begins to approach what we are attempting to do.





Education statistics published by AlifAilaan bolster the claim that our attempts are failing. 55% of class 5 students cannot read a story fluently in Urdu.10 76% cannot read a sentence fluently in English.11 In attempting to teach children four languages, they are mastering none. Something must change.

The discussion of which languages to focus on, and which to eliminate, incites fiery political and religious rhetoric. My proposed solution is simple. Let parents of primary children choose two languages: the main language of instruction, and a single other second language. Be it Urdu and Sindhi, Urdu and Arabic, English and Sindhi, or Sindhi

and Mandarin. Then, in secondary, parents and students can opt to select another second language. Of the three total (one main, two second), one must be Urdu, the national language. We do not need every person to know every language. We need stewards, care-takers, flag-bearers, of the great languages spoken in this land. We need to produce poets, philosophers, scientists, and great speakers of these languages, not millions of people who grasp only the shadow of each. Making such a change would reduce the load on students, allow more time in school for other core subjects such as Math, Science, and Social Studies, and refocus our nation's education system to help our

children succeed.
